Saint Bartholomew (24th August)

In the New Testament, Bartholomew is mentioned only in the lists of the apostles. Some scholars identify him with Nathanael, a man of Cana in Galilee who was summoned to Jesus by Philip. Jesus paid him a great compliment: "Here is a true Israelite. There is no duplicity in him" (John 1:47b). When Nathanael asked how Jesus knew him, Jesus said, "I saw you under the fig tree" (John 1:48b). Whatever amazing revelation this involved, it brought Nathanael to exclaim, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the King of Israel" (John 1:49b). But Jesus countered with, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than this" (John 1:50b).



Nathanael did see greater things. He was one of those to whom Jesus appeared on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias after his resurrection (see John 21:1-14). They had been fishing all night without success. In the morning, they saw someone standing on the shore though no one knew it was Jesus. He told them to cast their net again, and they made so great a catch that they could not haul the net in. Then John cried out to Peter, "It is the Lord."

When they brought the boat to shore, they found a fire burning, with some fish laid on it and some bread. Jesus asked them to bring some of the fish they had caught, and invited them to come and eat their meal. John relates that although they knew it was Jesus, none of the apostles presumed to inquire who he was. This, John notes, was the third time Jesus appeared to the apostles.

Bartholemew has traditionally been seen as the 'Apostle in India' and the area of his missionary activity being the Bombay region along the Konkan coast. He was also (more reliably) a missionary in Armenia with Jude (Thaddeus). Armenia is located between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea, at the North East border of Turkey. It was in Armenia that he was martyred – either cast into the sea, crucified or flayed alive (hence the knife with which he is typically depicted).

Reflection

Bartholomew or Nathanael? We are confronted again with the fact that we know almost nothing about most of the apostles. Yet the unknown ones were also foundation stones, the 12 pillars of the new Israel whose 12 tribes now encompass the whole earth. Their personalities were secondary—without thereby being demeaned—to their great office of bearing tradition from their firsthand experience, speaking in the name of Jesus, putting the Word Made Flesh into human words for the enlightenment of the world. Their holiness was not an introverted contemplation of their status before God. It was a gift that they had to share with others. The Good News was that all are called to the holiness of being Christ's members, by the gracious gift of God

Saint Mary's Church Leigh Woods

'During August 1891 preparation for the new church (St Mary, Leigh Woods) had got to the point where Lady Smyth could lay the foundation stone with a canister of contemporary artefacts underneath. Although photographs exist of this occasion the stone can no longer been found – it is probably concealed by later additions in the region of the present choir vestry. There was general disappointment that because of bad winter weather the church was not completed until autumn 1892.'

Malaria and World Mosquito Day (Sunday 20th August)



World Mosquito Day was created in order to honour the discovery made of the link between humans, malaria, and mosquitoes. This is something that has changed the health industry considerably, ensuring that humans can be protected.

Malaria is a disease that mosquitoes carry, which is caused by a parasite. It is curable and preventable, yet sadly, it still threatens the lives of millions of people across the globe. It is important to note that not all mosquitoes transmit malaria; only infected female anopheles are able to transmit this to humans.

You may be wondering how malaria is transmitted by a mosquito. It is as simple as a bite. If a mosquito bites you and it has been carrying malaria, the parasite is going to be released into your bloodstream, which can infect your entire body. Mosquitos are typically most active at night and dusk, and so they do not usually bite during the day. However, it is important to make sure that your body is protected at all times.

The latest statistics show that approximately 435,000 people die of malaria every year. Not only this, but there is believed to be approximately 219 million cases of malaria every year across the world. These are pretty big statistics, right? A lot of people do not realize just how serious the problem is, especially those that live in areas that are not at risk.

Malaria can be found in over 100 countries. It is a condition that typically impacts the world's tropical areas. Nevertheless, roughly 70 percent of the malaria burden around the world is concentrated in 11 countries. One being India, and the rest being on the African continent.

In the UK there were high levels of mortality due to 'the ague' (malaria) from the 15th to 19th century. This was particularly prevalent in London and the Southeast. The rapid decline in malaria cases from the 19th century onwards has a variety of explanations; climate, drainage, livestock density and improved housing. Experts believe that even with climate change and temperature increase there is little chance of a return of malaria to the UK.

Facts about malaria

- Travelers that are not-immune and come from malaria-free areas are extremely vulnerable if they
 are infected with the disease. In 2010, singer Cheryl Cole became incredibly ill after she contracted
 malaria while on holiday in Africa. This should be a warning to everyone regarding just how
 dangerous the disease is.
- Malaria parasites have developed resistance to a lot of the drugs that are commonly used, including
 artemisinin and chloroquine, and this resistance is spreading quickly. As a consequence, the battle
 for malaria continues and a lot of health professionals continue searching for better medicines that
 fight against malaria.
- Malaria was eliminated from Greece officially in 1974.
- In a lot of the high-income countries, the disease is under control. This is because of effective monitoring and aggressive prevention measures.






