

George Herbert English poet and orator - Commemoration 27th February

Although it is for his English devotional poetry that George Herbert is best known, his other works are also worthy of note. Very few of his writings were formally published until after his death, but then he became widely known and read after his friend Nicholas Ferrar succeeded in having 'The Temple' published by Cambridge University in 1633. Unfortunately, many of Herbert's personal papers were almost certainly lost as a result of the English Civil War.



Poetry Collection - 'The Temple'

Herbert wrote poetry from an early age. After he died, a collection of over 160 of his poems was published and given the title 'The Temple'. It is impossible to determine at what stage of his life each of these poems was written, but we do know that some were revised at Bemerton and others were composed here. 'The Temple' was so popular in the 17th century that no less than 13 editions were published between 1633 and 1709.

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The main body of poems carries the sub-title 'The Church', and this section includes all of Herbert's best-known poems. One of the most notable features is the wide variety of metrical forms employed by Herbert. The collection concludes with a single long verse entitled 'The Church Militant'.

A Priest to the Temple

Herbert wrote this treatise during his time at Bemerton. Sub-titled 'The Country Parson, His Character, and Rule of Holy Life', in the preface he writes:

"I have resolved to set down the Form and Character of a true Pastor, that I may have a Mark to aim at".

While it was written to clear his own mind, it was also aimed at all those who ministered to similar parishes. In particular, he addresses the practical difficulties of bringing the word of God to poorly educated folk and the need for the clergy to set an example for others to follow. First published in 1652, it remains influential to this day.

Outlandish Proverbs

George Herbert's pleasure in brevity fed his interest in proverbs, which he collected over the years, and also possibly wrote some himself. The collection of over 1000 proverbs was first published in 1640, and again with additions in 1651 under the title 'Jacula Prudentum'. Some of these sayings are still used in modern form today.

'Who is so deaf that will not hear'
'Good words are worth much, and cost little'

The Altar George Herbert

A broken Altar, Lord, thy servant reares,
Made of a heart, and cemented with teares:
Whose parts are as thy hand did frame;
No workmans tool hath touch'd the same.

A Heart alone
Is such a stone,
As nothing but
Thy pow'r doth cut.
Wherefore each part
Of my hard heart
Meets in this frame,
To praise thy Name;
That, if I chance to hold my peace,
These stones to praise thee may not cease.
O let thy blessed Sacrifice be mine,
And sanctifie this Altar to be thine.

Notes. This poem is displayed like an Altar; and the 'heart' is an Altar, cemented with tears of brokenness which binds and rebinds our relationships just as mortar binds stone. See Psalm 51:17.

Flower Gifts at Easter



Easter is the holiest day of the Christian calendar, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. At Easter flowers are frequently used in abundance to express the joy and triumph of the holiday. And are all the more striking following the season of Lent when flowers have not been used inside church.

Several flowers are traditionally associated with Easter, having acquired symbolic meaning over the years. *Easter lilies*: Easter lilies, with their large white trumpet-shaped blooms and lovely fragrance, are the most well-known flower used at Easter. There are many meanings associated with this flower: for example, the white hue represents Jesus's purity, and the shape of the trumpet recalls the trumpet of the angel Gabriel. Also, the flower grows from a bulb buried in the ground, which is considered symbolic of Christ's resurrection.

Flowers in Lent

During the long period of Lent, preceding the Easter celebrations, we observe a time of reflection and fasting and most churches avoid using flowers within the church as this reflects the solemnity of the season. We will continue to have a small arrangement within the Tower, and not in church, as part of the welcome to all visitors and users of our rental spaces. It is also an opportunity to appreciate the gift that our flower team give us throughout the year with their creative work which connects with the seasons and liturgy




